We had some pleasing news yesterday which was that we received some data from the Brightpath Writing team about our school's NAPLAN writing scores. Since beginning implementing Brighpath Writing in 2019, students in years 3 & 5 have seen some profound improvement in their NAPLAN writing scores over the past 4 years, with the biggest changes being in understanding of audience, text structure, ideas, paragraphing, sentence structure and spelling. We still need to do some work in the areas of cohesion, vocabulary and punctuation, which we will plan for next year. It is great to see the hard work of both staff and students paying off and we love to read the work of our improving writers and see how far they have come.

We celebrated World Teachers' Day last week with a special morning tea provided by the local churches and ended the day with a lucky dip for our teachers and a special "hats off" for all of their fabulous work.

Visit from David Booth

David Booth visited our school and conducted three sessions: one for the kindy, one for the two younger classes and another for the two older classes. David adapted his presentation depending on the age of the children and shared how Aboriginal people sourced everything they needed from their environment and always looked after country. He also showed different tools that he brought with him and explained how they were made and what they were used for; he described the differences between a number of boomerangs and how they were used for hunting. David spoke about the ceremonial and cultural significance of music, dance and paint in Aboriginal learning and some students had the opportunity to apply ochre paint that David made during the lesson.

The children were told how local native plants were used by First Nations People. She-oak was used to keep away thirst on a long journey and bottle brush to make a sweet cordial, by soaking it in water and pouring it through she-oak leaves which act like a sieve. Children were excited to find a she-oak tree in the yard following the lesson.

Biodiversity McLaren Vale: Junior John McLaren Award, report by Ethan in Year 5

Since June 2019, our family has been part of Biodiversity McLaren Vale (BMV). BMV is a joint initiative of the local community, industry and the government. In simple terms, the group removes feral vegetation from creek lines within the McLaren Vale region and replaces them with native plant species. These new seedlings are then nurtured and later we monitor them, as the new environment flourishes and essential native fauna returns to the area. Annually, BMV

presents an award called the John McLaren Award. This award is presented for "all round excellence of contribution to BMV's work". As far as I know, this year, in addition to the main award, a new one was established –the Junior John McLaren Award, which is presented to "the young members of the community". At our recent field day, me and Immy were presented with this award for our consistent and longest serving volunteering with BMV. We come to these events not because of the prizes, but because we love the community and the stuff that they do.



Science Awards

Near the beginning of the term, Nate, Lincoln, Alijah and Tyler were invited to attend the Oliphant Science Awards Presentations at Brighton Secondary College. Nate, Alijah and Lincoln won 4th place in the R-4 Rowe Scientific prizes for a joint project called The Cyclone, and Tyler won 3rd place in the 5-9 Rowe Scientific prizes for his entry titled Wind Turbine. All four boys represented our school well and won money for their seriously cool entries. Congratulations and good luck for everyone with next year's entries!



BusSAfe Visit



We had a visit from BusSAfe last week who presented a session on safety in and around buses. Children were shown the steps on the side of a bus that they could use in the event of having to evacuate through the window.
