Featuring the Year 3-4 Class

It has been a very busy and exciting term in the Year 3-4 classroom. In English we have been reading and writing narratives and poems, and have created dioramas of our favourite scenes; this has been so much fun! We have collected twigs, sand, leaves and much more to make our dioramas look realistic. Roald Dahl books were a big focus and as a class we read *The Enormous Crocodile* and *The BFG*.

In maths we have been focusing on fractions which has been challenging but also fun as there is lots of hands-on learning. One of our favourite activities was measuring objects in the classroom using fractions and creating fractions from our name – you will be able to see these in the office.

One of the biggest events of our term was our excursion to the Maritime Museum. We have been looking at Early World Explorers and The First Fleet, and the European impact on Australia. The best part was playing on a replica of a tall ship and exploring below deck, in bunkers, and steering with the giant wheel. We are currently doing a research project on James Cook and Matthew Flinders.







We set a goal at the start of the term to 'Run to Uluru', which has seen us doing many, many laps around the oval as we collectively run metres then kilometres to reach a distance of 1,625km which is the equivalent of Clarendon to Uluru! With wet weather and sore legs, we have not quite reached it and will continue to run well into Term 3. This is all part of our health learning as we practice moderate and rigorous exercise.

Zosia's Fijian Holiday

Zosia and her family have been enjoying a holiday in Fiji; Zosia was lucky enough to attend a private school for some of the time they were away and made some new friends: Jasmin, Rajita and Mira-Kumar. The school day is structured similarly to ours with literacy in the morning and maths in the afternoon, and Zosia was also able to attend OSHC where they did some dancing. Zosia found it funny that the bottom half of the school uniform is exactly like here at Clarendon: navy blue skort, but the shirt is very colourful and cheerful. They have a pool at school but because it's currently winter (ie *only* 26°C!) they don't use it. The class has only 8 students and the school goes from R-3. In public schools classes are massive, and the girls and boys wear the same uniform of a white shirt, a traditional skirt (even for boys as it is better for humid tropics heat) and black sandals.





\$1000 Landcare Grant for Habitat Boxes

Tiffany and Ryan from Woolworths, Aberfoyle Park came to school this week to present us with a \$1,000 Landcare Grant and also delivered an unexpected surprise of a box of bananas and a crate of apples for our Kitchen Garden program. We plan to use the grant for habitat boxes so the Young Environmental Leaders (YEL) enjoyed showing them around the school to point out the areas we will revegetate and where we will install the bird boxes. Tiffany and Ryan said they would like to return to our school when it is complete to see the final result.

We have had a lot happening in our library this term. Firstly, I would like to say a huge THANK YOU to Julia Johnson for volunteering her time and helping to keep the books organised and tidy, also for her wonderful display for International Asteroid Day. It has been great to work with her and share ideas about all things books!

Book Review – *Stolen Focus* by Johann Hari

When I was given this book to read, I was a little dubious that I would be able to get through it...ironic considering the title. I thought it would be very dry but I was pleasantly surprised. The style of writing is so engaging that I actually couldn't put it down!

It's an insightful look into why, as a society, we are struggling to keep our focus. Johann gives us opposing points of view backed by research while covering a variety of angles. Technology, and how we are manipulated by it, is a big part (the depth of this manipulation shocked me), however, there is so much more.

While often these kinds of books can leave you feeling overwhelmed by the enormity of change required, I was pleased to be given some practical tools to put in place to help regain focus. I was also, once again, reminded how grateful I am to live in a community that places great value on the things that help us battle this issue like connection to nature and community.
