Principal's Message

Another action-packed year at Clarendon Primary School has ended. We have had an absolutely fantastic year filled with many different events, excursions and camps. Each of the classes had a sleepover opportunitythe Receptions had a school sleepover, the 1-2s with their amazing camp at Monarto Zoo, the 3-4s went to Mylor Camp and the 5-6s to Wirraway Homestead. We had our first ever whole school plus kindy excursion to Warriparinga Wetlands and the new playground at Glenthorne National Park. We celebrated and experienced teachers, elders, sports, outdoor learning, nature play and maths days as well as Harmony Day plus Book, Reconciliation, Volunteer, SSO & Science weeks. We held three assemblies each term, proudly sharing our learning and we watched the kids become more confident speaking in front of crowds.

Around the school in 2023, we have seen a few physical changes with the development of the mini-classroom adjoined to the 3-4 classroom. What was once a space for storage and art equipment has become an organised, freshly painted and carpeted space that students can use for group work, regulation and working with members of staff. Additionally, we were able to fund built-in storage and furniture in the senior primary classrooms, a Torres Strait Islander flagpole, the fence near the car park and we began the retaining upgrade of the playground.

One of our major changes at the school was that our young leaders worked with students from all classes to develop our new school values which are simply: *Be Kind, Work Hard*. We look forward to putting these in place from 2024 and beyond. What more could we want from our kids, but to display these two values?

A huge thanks must go to the amazing staff of Clarendon Primary School who work so hard for our kids each and every day, as well as our volunteers who keep our programs running and costs low. I thank them all for their dedication, enthusiasm and altruism. Have a great holiday and rest over the summer. We all deserve it.

A Letter from the Member for Wright





Hon Blair Boyer MP Member for Wright

Dear parent/caregiver

Every child deserves access to a great education – one that supports them to learn and thrive.

To achieve this, we need to remove barriers for students with a disability so they receive appropriate support, and we need to give schools extra funding to ensure they have the resources they need.

We've heard from parents, families, teachers and principals, that the application process to receive funding for children with additional needs can be a barrier to effective inclusion.

As such, we are implementing new arrangements from term 1, 2024, to give schools greater autonomy to respond to the needs of their students quickly.

Schools will no longer need to apply for funding to support individual students at Levels 1 to 3. These levels will be abolished, and schools will now automatically receive a grant based on the number of students with a disability.

The changes will mean schools will have access to funding from the start of the year to help plan for staffing, programs and resources that respond to the needs of their students.

It means better, more targeted support to the students who need it the most.

It will see an additional investment of more than \$50m over the next four years to strengthen support for students with disability.

The Inclusive Education Support Program (IESP) changes will reduce the workload for our staff while giving teachers and leaders greater autonomy and flexibility over how they use those funds – working with families to get the supports right.

For those children and young people who require intensive support, schools can still apply for additional funding above the grant.

These changes will make a big difference for our students with disabilities and will equip our schools with the resources to better plan for students' immediate and future learning needs.

These improvements will ensure South Australian students with disabilities thrive and prosper in a safe, inclusive and supportive learning environment – because they deserve it.
