As usual, a reminder from me that it's just another set tests that gives us some information that can help us to help your kids! We recently completed further testing on all students in the school from the suite of DIBELS reading tests. This was performed almost entirely by Danielle Sleep which has been a huge undertaking. The results from these tests have helped us to see which students need additional support and there have been some big changes to our SSO timetables because of it. By propping up those students who need it early on, we will develop their skills and confidence in reading so that it isn't a problem later in their schooling. We can also see which students are flying and give them opportunities for extension. If you'd like to know your child's results in the DIBELS tests, feel free to contact your child's teacher.

Carpark

As you will be aware, there has been a bit of angst about the state of the carpark. I'd like to thank those people who have brought this to my attention through emails, phone calls and conversations. This is the way we can make changes and I would hope that people feel confident to approach me about such matters. Our Governing Council reps (see GC article) are also great people to talk to about such issues as they are the representatives of our families, so please be sure to utilise them.

Last year this issue was brought to Governing Council who voted not to spend additional money on extending the carpark. GC had a discussion and decided that they would prefer the money to be spent on our kids: their learning and additional support staff. The fact that we have been running with four classes this year and last year when the Department has only funded us for three (due to a decrease in numbers with year 7s leaving and a big year 6 cohort also departing last year) has meant that the budget has been exceptionally tight and this can make things like carparks a low priority.

That being said, we have been trying to make some cheap improvements through our maintenance budget. It has been a work in progress and due to some illness and competing priorities here at school, our groundsman Jeff (who is an absolute superstar) hasn't been able to complete the works as yet.

Yesterday, however, we had a very generous offer from Brendan (Tristan and Damon's Dad) to work with us to

improve the carpark. We will look at utilising a small amount of some of the SA Water land next to the carpark for the turning circle. Brendan, Jeff and I will work on this over the coming months and there will be opportunities for community involvement in the way of a working bee or two in order to increase the number of car parks, etc. We will be able to use the Clarendon Op Shop money for this purpose.

I can't thank Brendan enough for his go-getter attitude. When he sees a problem, he comes to talk about it and offer time, physical help and support. I really hope when we have these working bees, we can all band together to make this happen: **many hands make light work**. In the meantime, for those who have trouble with the speed bumps, you really need to go the speed limit of 5km/hr maximum. Jeff will ensure that dips don't form under the humps.

Another option is you can always park in the kindy carpark and get some exercise up by walking up the hill to school. If you park there at the end of the day when you're collecting your child, it's a downhill walk for them to the car instead of uphill to the carpark.


