# **Uniform Policy Update**

We have made a minor modification to our Uniform Policy regarding footwear, specifically Crocs and that style of shoe; we consider these to be closed shoes that cover the toes. If you have any queries, please let us know. Here is the excerpt from the updated Uniform Policy:

The following shoes are appropriate for school: sturdy shoes with socks including closed sneakers, leather 'work' boots, school shoes, strong sandals and rubber sandals (eg Crocs) worn with the back strap in place (sportsmode), and without any Jibbitz (additional shoe accessories). Closed shoes that cover the toes must be worn during lessons in the kitchen and the garden.
